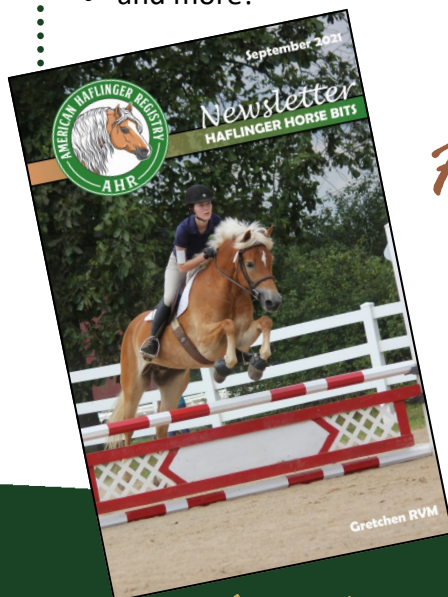

History of the Haflinger

The breed origin can be traced to medieval times when writings told of a horse found in the Southern Tyrolean Mountains, a remote region accessible only by narrow paths, requiring agile and surefooted horses.

The first official documentation of the present day Haflinger (named for the Tyrolean village of Hafling) was in 1874 when the foundation stallion 249 Folie was born of a half-Arabian stallion crossed with a refined native Tyrolean mare. All modern purebred Haflingers must trace their ancestry directly to Folie. World War II military requirements led to a shorter and stockier packhorse. Since the war, the height and refinement of the breed have returned, with an emphasis on developing a small horse versatile for both riding and driving. Characteristics of the Haflinger include a strong constitution, solid conformation with substantial bone, and an uncomplicated personality.

The Perfect Family Horse

The specialty of the Haflinger lies, of course, in its unique golden chestnut coloring with a long, flowing ivory mane and tail. But more unique is the people-loving, willing and forgiving temperament that was established over centuries of living alongside and working with the mountain peasants, serving all purposes for all family members. Haflingers simply became part of the family.

The modern Haflinger is now found all over the world, active in such varied disciplines as English, western, dressage, jumping, vaulting, pleasure and combined driving, trail riding, endurance, and draft hitches, and they are frequently used for farm work and in therapeutic riding programs. Haflingers hold their own in competition with other breeds, showing surprising athleticism and strength for their size.
